Assembly Member Smalley wished everyone a "hoppy" Easter, and thanked Dennis Tidwell and Duane Bannock for their dedication to the borough. He noted Ms. Schmitter-Schrier had done very well in her presentation regarding Matti's Farm. He thanked Assembly Member Murphy for bringing forward an issue with mixed popularity and thanked the constituents for their comments during the meeting.

Vice President Pierce said he attended the School Board Meeting on April 2, 2012 and stated he was impressed with some of the remarkable programs being offered to students. He said the School District was doing an excellent job teaching the children. He wished everyone a happy Easter, and noted his respect for Duane Bannock. He said out of respect when an ordinance is brought forward it was generally introduced and public discussion took place, it was important to allow the process.

Assembly Member Haggerty said Duane Bannock reminded him of the roles played by actor Harvey Keitel who was the person who came in to fix things. He noted he had just returned from his Dad's memorial, and stated that his Dad was a City Councilman in Tucson, Arizona, which was an elected position; however, his Dad was appointed, and a signs over his Dad's desk read, "Sometimes the right thing to do is unpopular, and sometimes a popular thing to do is not right."

Assembly Member Johnson thanked the constituents who spoke during the meeting, and noted it was a valuable part of government. He said often times after reading the packet he forms a position on a subject, and then after hearing other insight on the matter his position changes. He stated he had attended the Wooly Mammoth presentation at Kenai Peninsula College and said it was fabulous and recommended everyone see it. He reminded everyone that it was over a year ago when he intended to bring forward an ordinance asking if the constituents wanted to continue funding the college, and noted that since mentioning it no one has contacted him supporting the issue; therefore, he would not be bringing it forward.

Assembly Member McClure said her approach while in office was to try and keep an open mind and listen, she tried not to have a preconceived idea, because she was representing people and wanted to hear what they had to say before forming an opinion. She said she was glad to hear that Mayor Navarre had participated in the "Choose Respect Rally," and noted there was also one held in Seward in which she participated.

Assembly Member Tauriainen thanked the constituents who spoke during the meeting, and noted his appreciation for Mr. Pierce's call for civility. He stated for the most part it was civil; however, sometimes in the political arena civility was forgotten.

He thanked Assembly Member Haggerty for sharing the message written on the sign in his Dad's office.

Assembly Member Murphy apologized to anyone who took her remarks in the wrong way. She noted that while visiting the Service Area Boards over the last few weeks she had always tried to be respectful of the people in attendance. She stated her intent with Ordinance 2012-07 was not to take rights away from the people, her intent was to increase participation in the public process. She said she respected everyone who participated in the public process. She wished Duane Bannock and Dennis Tidwell the best.

President Knopp stated that prior to being a member of the Assembly his world was black and white, now that he was on the Assembly his world is grey. He noted that he decided to run for Assembly because he did not want one of his friends representing him, and felt he could do a better job. He said it had been an incredible learning experience, there were more failures than reward; however, never a day of regret. He said the Kenai Peninsula Borough Assembly did not always vote the same on issues, and did always have a lot of debate. He used the example of working hard to make sure Assembly Member Smith would be able to run for his last election, not because he agreed with Assembly Member Smith since roughly eighty percent of the time he did not; however, Assembly Member Smith fought hard for his constituents. He said public testimony was very important to him, and that had a lot of impact on his decisions.

ADJOURNMENT

With no further business to come before the assembly, President Knopp adjourned the meeting at 10:06 p.m.

Litigation Status Report

Following is a summary of the major lawsuits in which the borough and school district are involved. This list does not include the real property tax foreclosures and numerous standard tax collection cases pursued by the borough.

1. Alliance of Concerned Taxpayers, Inc. v. KPB. Case No. 3KN-06-1129 CI / S-13596 and S-13883. The Alliance of Concerned Taxpayers, Inc. ("ACT") sued the borough for alleged violations of two initiatives: 1) limiting the sales tax to 2 percent and requiring 60 percent voter approval to increase it; and 2) requiring 60 percent voter approval before spending more than \$1 million on a capital improvement project. Final Judgment was entered July 30, 2009, in favor of the borough on both issues. ACT appealed that decision to the Alaska Supreme Court. The superior court awarded attorney fees to the borough on the sales tax issue but declined to award attorney fees to the borough on the capital improvement issue because it held ACT qualified as a public interest litigant on that issue. The borough appealed the public interest litigant finding. Briefing is complete and oral argument was held in September, 2011 on all issues in the case. The borough is now awaiting the supreme court's decision.

- 2. Alliance of Concerned Taxpayers, Inc. v. KPB and KPBSD. Case No. 3KN-07-896 CI / S-13594. The Alliance of Concerned Taxpayers ("ACT") sued the borough and school district asking the court to require the assembly and school board to vacate the seats occupied by members elected in October 2007 who had already served two consecutive terms based on initiatives approved in October 2007. The court held that the school board term limit initiative was not legal, that applying the assembly term limits to candidates elected in 2007 was not legal, and that the rest of the assembly term limits ordinance was valid. The parties filed cross-motions to determine which party prevailed and whether ACT is a public interest litigant. The court concluded that neither party prevailed for purposes of awarding attorney fees. ACT appealed that order to the Alaska Supreme Court and is seeking full attorney fees from the borough. The Supreme Court issued an order consolidating this case with case no. S-13596 described above in paragraph one for purposes of issuing its decision. Briefing and oral argument are finished in both cases and which are now ripe for a decision from the court.
- 3. Horan v. KPB Board of Equalization, Pacific Park Limited Partnership. Case No. 3KN-07-686 CI/S-13333. Appeal of the July 11, 2007, board of equalization decision regarding the valuation of Pacific Park Limited Partnership apartments. The superior court issued a decision in October 2008. KPB (Horan) appealed that decision to the Alaska Supreme Court. Settlement negotiations were not fruitful. The Supreme Court remanded the case back to the board of equalization to provide further findings to support its decision. Pacific Park moved for attorney's fees and costs in superior court which the Assessor opposed. The court has not issued a decision on fees and costs to date. The hearing on remand was held November 17, 2011. The BOE issued a decision on remand and an appeal was filed. The case is now closed.
- 4. Kahtnu Ventures LLC. v. State of Alaska Dept. of Health and Social Services, Central Peninsula General Hospital, Inc. and Kenai Peninsula Borough. Case No. 3AN-11-12713CI. Kahtnu Ventures LLC, a group of local surgeons, filed an application for a certificate of need that would enable them to open an ambulatory surgery center in Kenai. They included the Kenai Peninsula Borough as part of the relief requested was to prevent construction of the fourth operating room at Central Peninsula Hospital. Kahtnu recently attempted to dismiss the case against the borough and CPGH, Inc. Settlement discussions are underway.
- 5. **Price v. Kenai Peninsula Borough and Johni Blankenship, Clerk.** Case No. 3KN-11-404 CI. James Price sued the borough for its rejection of referendum petition no. 2010-01. This petition requested a borough-wide vote to repeal ordinance 2008-28, which allowed the cities in the borough to opt out of the seasonal sales tax exemption. The petition was rejected because it constituted local and special legislation and directly conflicted with AS 29.45.700 delegating to the assembly the authority to allow the city to tax sources that the borough does

not. Both parties filed motions for summary judgment, oppositions, and replies thereto. Oral argument was held before the superior court on November 8, 2011. The court ruled in the borough's favor that the referendum constituted local and special legislation and did not reach the issue of whether it directly conflicted with a state statute. Final judgment was issued on March 21, 2012. Price has 30 days from that date to appeal to the supreme court.

- 6. Reekie v. KPB, KPBSD, et al. Case no. 3AN-11-12440 CI. Justin Reekie, Raymond Reekie and Shawn Leigh Reekie filed suit against the borough, the school district, the American Legion, Department of Alaska, Inc. and numerous other entities and individuals for damages allegedly sustained by Justin during baseball batting practice held at Homer High School on or about March 24, 2010. The borough's and school district's answers have been filed. Plaintiffs recently filed a motion to amend their complaint to add more parties.
- 7. **State v. Offshore Systems-Kenai.** Case No. 3KN-08-453 CI/ S-13994. The State sued OSK to enjoin it from blocking public access to the beach across property now owned by OSK. The borough filed a motion to intervene in this case, which the court granted. All parties have filed motions for summary judgment and the court denied the state's motion for a preliminary judgment that would have allowed beach access. A two-week trial was completed and post-trial motion work is finished. The Court issued a final judgment in the borough's and state's favor and the borough was awarded costs and attorney fees as it was designated a prevailing party. However, OSK has appealed to the Alaska Supreme Court and was granted a stay of award of costs and attorney's fees pending resolution by the Supreme Court. Briefing is complete, oral argument was held October 21, 2011, and we are awaiting a decision from the Alaska Supreme Court.
- 8. **Uei v. KPB.** Case No. 3KN-11-278 CI. Katherine Uei and her minor son sued the borough for injuries allegedly sustained when her son was involved in an altercation with a member of the public while in the lobby of the Nikiski pool. The parties exchanged discovery, attended a settlement conference before Judge Hopwood on March 13, 2012, and settled the case.

III. Ongoing Program Projects and Monthly Accomplishments

Hazard Tree Removal

- Contracts continued to be developed and bids solicited for expending funds accepted and appropriated by KPB from the 2009 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act ("ARRA"). These funds are dedicated to the creation of jobs by implementing hazardous fuel mitigation and FireWise education projects on the Kenai Peninsula. It is anticipated that all ARRA funds will be encumbered or expended by the end of April 2012.
- Project plans were developed for the 25 acre Cohoe Corner Fuel Reduction Project located at Mile 8.0 Cohoe Loop Road in Kasilof. This project was bid mid March 2012 with project work expected to begin by the first week of April 2012.
 Approximately 200 cords of firewood is planned to be distributed at a later date through the KPB Firewood Permit process.
- Project plans continued to be developed for the 90 acre Alaska State Park Diamond Creek Recreation Area Fuel Reduction
 Project with project work scheduled to begin May/June 2012.
- Project plans continued to be developed for the 30 acre Alaska Johnson Lake State Park Fuel Reduction Project with project work scheduled to begin May/June 2012.
- SBB staff coordinated with contractors that have purchased KPB timber sales (Stariski Southeast, Stariski South, Four Mile, and Belnap timber sales). Project work on these timber sales is expected to begin summer/winter 2012.
- SBB staff administered Land Use Permits in Kasilof, Anchor Point, Soldotna, and Hope. These Permits are designed to remove 75 acres of beetle-kill near Centennial Lake, 45 acres of beetle-kill in Anchor Point, 35 acres of beetle kill and recent windthrow near Deville Road between Soldotna and Sterling, and 7 acres of beetle-kill at Mile 9 Hope Highway. The Anchor Point and Hope LUPs expire at the end of March 2012.

Reforestation

Project plans were developed to inventory the Larch/Pine provenance trials in late April 2012. These trials were established
on three sites by KPB in 2002 to identify for landowners fast growing tree provenances suitable for planting on the Kenai
Peninsula.

Technical Assistance

- SBB staff continued to assist the US Forest Service Forest Health Protection Program in creating a systematic inventory of
 economic and societal costs/losses on the Kenai Peninsula resulting from the spruce bark beetle outbreak of the past
 twenty years. This effort is part of a national US Forest Service project to documents the costs/effects of forest mortality
 throughout the western US from bark beetles and associated pathogens.
- SBB staff assisted the Alaska Division of Forestry develop fire behavior material for use by out-of –area firefighters deployed on Kenai Peninsula wildfires..

Land/Vegetation Mapping

 GIS specialist has dedicated most of this month's time toward the update / remapping of anadromous streams across the Borough.

Seasonal Fire Personnel

No Seasonal Fire Personnel activities occurred in January.

1	WHEREAS,	in the August 22, 2006 State of Alaska election, Alaska voters approved the
2		initiative in Ballot Measure 2, enacting AS $43.52.200-43.52.295$, which imposed
3		a tax on travel aboard certain cruise ships travelling in Alaska waters; and
4	WHEREAS,	the Alaska legislature has authorized the sharing of Commercial Passenger Vessel
5		(CPV) excise tax collections with eligible ports of call in the State; and
6	WHEREAS,	CPV excise tax collections are derived from taxes imposed on cruise ship

8	WHEREAS,	the City of Seward and City of Homer are eligible ports of call for receiving CPV

\$324,865 to the City of Seward and \$32,687.50 to the City of Homer

In the August 22, 2006, election the Alaska voters approved the initiative in Ballot Measure No. 2, which imposed a tax on passengers travelling for at least 72 hours aboard a vessel with 250 or more berths, that anchors or moors in Alaska waters with the intent to allow passengers to disembark. The initiative enacted statutes AS 43.52.200 - AS 43.52.295 that provide for the levy and collection of this tax and the disposition of the proceeds. The taxes are deposited into a state fund called the Commercial Passenger Vessel (CPV) tax account. A portion of the proceeds are disbursed to the first seven ports of call each year. If ports of call are located in a city within a borough, \$2.50 per passenger is distributed to the city and to the borough in which the city is located. Both the City of Seward and the City of Homer have qualified for these funds, and the borough has accordingly received proceeds from the CPV account.

For the calendar years 2007 through 2010 the tax proceeds were awarded to the City of Seward and City of Homer by way of grant agreements. The use of funds must comply with State of Alaska Department of Commerce, Community & Economic Development, "Commercial Vessel Passenger Tax Program" as governed by AS 43.52.200 - 43.52.295; specifically, AS 43.52.230 (b), "federal legislation and court rulings that permit the use of these funds for port facilities, harbor infrastructure, and other services provided to the commercial passenger vessels and the passengers on board those vessels."

This ordinance will approve the 2011 calendar year appropriations to be allocated to the City of Seward and the City of Homer, which will be executed by way of grant agreements. Brenda Ahlberg, the Community & Fiscal Projects Manager, shall oversee the program.

The City appreciates that and understands that the amount to be passed through for calendar year 2011 is \$32,687.50.

The City of Homer recognizes that these funds must be used for port and harbor improvements that directly benefit cruise ship passengers. The City agrees to comply with the provisions contained in AS 43.52.200-298 and former SB 256 and HB 310. Dear Mayor Navarre,

On behalf of the community of Seward, I would like to thank the Borough Assembly and administration for allocating the Commercial Passenger Vessel (CPV) excise tax to the cities of Seward and Homer, based on their pro-rata share of cruise ship passengers visiting each port. These funds have been critical to Seward's ability to provide improvements to our port infrastructure in support of cruise ships and their passengers.

The City of Seward was asked to submit a letter requesting their allotment of 2011 cruise ship head tax proceeds, and to identify the intended use of these funds. AS 43.52.230(b) requires that "a city or borough that receives a payment under this subsection shall use the funds for port facilities, harbor infrastructure, and other services provided to the commercial passenger vessels and the passengers on board those vessels." Seward's planned use of these 'ports-of-call' funds will entirely meet these requirements. We have identified the following projects for utilization of CPV funds, including: 1) harbor dredging (\$550K); 2) bus transportation for cruise passengers and crew (\$200K); 3) ambulance services (\$10K); 4) harbor restroom repairs and upgrades (\$100K); 5) cruise ship dock maintenance and repairs (\$220K); 6) cruise ship berth enhancements (\$1.31 million), as well as other port and harbor infrastructure needs.

We appreciate your support of our request, and look forward to working with you to enhance facilities for the cruise ship industry in our region.

the Seward Bear Creek Flood Service Area

The Seward Bear Creek Flood Service Area (SBCFSA) was established as a service area in 2003. The SBCFSA board completed a local flood hazard mitigation plan (FHMP) in July 2005, which was updated in 2007 and 2010. Mitigation efforts to date in the SBCFSA have focused primarily on debris removal from rivers and streams on an as-needed and emergency basis. However, an annex that identifies and prioritizes mitigation projects in the service area should be completed and added to the 2010 FHMP. Therefore, the borough applied for funds through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program to complete such an annex, and award notification was recently received from the Alaska Department of Homeland Security & Emergency Management.

The proposed annex will follow a framework to be completed by a consulting firm. After acquiring and compiling the necessary data, a baseline flood risk assessment for SBCFSA will be performed. Future conditions, hazard identification and risk assessment will lead to the development and evaluation of adaptation options to be presented through a series of public meetings. The final annex will serve as: (1) a revision to the local Flood Hazard Mitigation Plan; (2) an addendum to the Kenai Peninsula Borough All Hazard Mitigation Plan; and (3) a prioritization summary of mitigation projects to be completed within the SBCFSA.

In closing, the consultant will be expected to work with the project manager and provide written progress reports and public presentations to SBCFSA board of directors and area residents.

Additionally, the consultant will present the final annex to the borough assembly for adoption consideration into the KPB All Hazard Mitigation Plan.

At a special board meeting held February 23, 2012, the service area board failed to pass a motion recommending acceptance of the grant. The vote was three in favor and one against and a minimum of four affirmative votes is required to pass a motion. The board chair is expected to provide additional information and the board may consider this again. The project performance period ends February 2013; however, a request extending the performance period will be submitted to the granting agency, allowing the final annex to be completed. Dan Mahalak, the borough's Water Resource Manager, shall provide grant oversight and project completion.

Following are some amendments proposed to address the concerns discussed regarding the application of KPB Chapter 21.18 to small parcels and the beginning point of regulation on anadromous waterbodies:

> Amend the title as follows:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING KPB 21.18.025(B), 21.18.081, [21.18.100,] AND 21.18.140 TO PERMIT CERTAIN STRUCTURES IN TIDALLY INUNDATED AREAS, AND CONDITIONALLY PERMIT CERTAIN STRUCTURES WITHIN THE HABITAT PROTECTION DISTRICT AND ADDING DEFINITIONS

Insert a new Section 1 as follows and renumber the existing Section 1 to Section 2:

SECTION 1. That KPB 21.18.025 (B) is hereby amended as follows:

B. In addition to the water bodies listed in 21.18.025(A), all anadromous waterbodies within the municipal boundaries of the Kenai Peninsula Borough which are listed in the "Atlas and Catalogue of Waters Important for Spawning, Rearing, or Migration of Anadromous Fish" as periodically updated and published by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game, EXCLUDING ALL PORTIONS OF WATERWAYS FOUND WITHIN THE SEWARD-BEAR CREED FLOOD SERVICE AREA, are subject to this chapter as of January 1, 2012, excluding the following:

- 1. All portions of waterways found within the Seward-Bear Creek Flood Service Area are exempt from KPB 21.18,
- 2. Braided Channels, Tide Dominated Deltas, Estuaries and Lagoons which are primarily seawater and are identified as anadromous in the State of Alaska Atlas and Catalogue of Waters Important for Spawning, Rearing, or Migration of Anadromous Fish are exempt from KPB 21.18.
- ➤ Amend newly numbered Section 2, KPB 21.18.081(B)(10)(b) as follows, with new changes shown in **bold**:
- 10. A principal structure or an addition to a principal structure may be approved within the habitat protection district provided all the following standards are met:
 - a. The parcel boundaries were defined prior to January 1, 2012.
 - b. The parcel [IS SUBJECT TO A CITY BUILDING CODE AND] is served by a public sewer system or sewage holding tank or septic system, provided the holding tank or septic system are located entirely outside the habitat protection district.
 - c. The parcel has an area of .3 acres or less and less than 4,000 square feet of total developed impervious coverage.
 - d. The parcel has less than 4,000 square feet of suitable development area outside the habitat protection district.
 - [d]e. On the portion of the parcel within the habitat protection district, the total impervious coverage may not exceed 50% of the area able to sustain native vegetation, or [5,000] 3,000 square feet of area able to sustain native vegetation, whichever is less.
 - [e]f. The standard for development is to first utilize suitable parcel areas outside the HPD[AS A PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE TO DEVELOPMENT WITHIN A HPD]. Within the HPD, it is preferred to minimize impact by preserving the nearshore areas which may sustain native vegetation.
- ➤ Delete the original Section 2 that added a new section E to KPB 21.18.100.
- Add the following additional definitions to Section 3, KPB 21.18.140:
 - AF. "Mile Zero" The downstream beginning point of the anadromous waters identified in 21.18, and the riparian zone defined as the habitat protection district. On riverine systems subject to tidal inundation, Mile Zero begins at the elevation of mean high tide, where not otherwise designated by KPB code or prior designations.

- AG. "Estuary" means a semi-enclosed coastal body of water with a free connection to the sea and in which seawater is measurably diluted with freshwater derived from land drainage.
- AH. "Braided Channels" means the intertwined branches or secondary channels of a river or stream and characterized by the separation and rejoining of two or more channels separated by bars or islands.
- AI. "Lagoon" means relatively shallow bodies of water, mostly-enclosed, with an oceanic source, separated by a low-lying swatch of land, such as a spit or barrier island. This oceanic source may be continual or episodic, such as storm-induced overwash, and generally has a different salinity as a result of its restricted access.
- AJ. "Tide Dominated Delta" means a river delta subject to tidal inundation as well as tidal and storm erosion which may be mainly submarine with prominent bars or ridges.

The Ordinance 2012-06 has been aimed at resolving more than one issue.

The first issue at hand was finding ways to conditionally permit small parcel development when the restrictions of 21.18 might unduly reduce the development value of private property. Further considerations were to apply this remedy in a way that did not go beyond the values placed by the Assembly and Planning Commission during the years of administering 21.18. Thus the Ordinance 2012-06 and these amendments strive to strike a reasonable balance between development and conservation.

The second issue revolves around identifying the seaward starting point for the habitat protection district. Much work and discussion was invested in an attempt to define a logical and consistent methodology for making these determinations. The final result recognizes the differences between the types of anadromous waterbodies, identified in the Atlas of Anadromous Waters, as they enter seawater.

For riverine systems, the elevation of mean high tide establishes the seaward limit of the habitat protection district. Some of these riverine system "Mile Zero" points have already been determined, so the amendment does not change those determinations and maintains current practice.

For other types of systems, (seawater systems: braided channels, tide dominated deltas, estuaries and lagoons) it became apparent that the riparian area protections of 21.18 were not the ideal vehicle for establishing appropriate protections for these areas. Because of the

seawater dominated nature and potential variation of location and water coverage of these areas, the Habitat Protection District approach does not well achieve the goal of protecting water quality.

These amendments are the result of an interchange of ideas between the public, science professionals, borough administration, Assembly member Haggerty and myself. Ordinance 2012-06 and these amendments are an important step in providing balance to KPB 21.18.

Your careful consideration and support will be appreciated.

This ordinance is intended to save money and time, reduce voter confusion during the election process and encourage public participation in serving on service area boards by changing service area boards from elected to appointed positions. Thousands of dollars will be saved annually by eliminating service area board seats from the elections process through reduced printing costs and time required of election judges and the Clerk's office. The borough has one of the most complicated election processes in the state which this action will help to simplify. Providing for appointed service area boards is intended to reduce voter confusion as the content of the voter pamphlet and number of ballots would be reduced as many service areas bifurcate precincts requiring more than one ballot for each. Historically there have been numerous vacant seats as well as seats where only one person has filed to run for a service area board. This ordinance is intended to encourage public interest in these seats by eliminating the need to run for office and otherwise comply with the election process requirements.

An appointed board has worked well for the Road Service Area and the borough is one of, if not the only municipality in the state, with elected service area boards. Further, the process is designed to maintain the integrity of the system as appointed board members will be required to meet certain service area specific criteria and must be confirmed by the assembly.

In the October 4, 2011, borough election the Lowell Point Emergency Service Area (Service Area) voters approved Proposition 4, abolishing the Service Area effective July 1, 2012. Assets owned by the Service Area at the time of dissolution, unless otherwise provided for, most likely will revert to the borough. Assets obtained through grants must be accounted for consistent with applicable grant requirements. Any funds not expended would be accumulated in the borough's general fund.

There are at least two relevant legal issues concerning the transfer of any assets to any entity that may wish to acquire the service area assets. Article IX, section 6 of the Alaska constitution requires that public assets only be used for public purposes. This limits the Service Area's ability to transfer the assets to either a sale at fair market value or a transfer to an entity providing public services. Additionally, the borough can only expend resources for powers it is authorized to exercise. Once the Service area is abolished the borough will no longer have the authority to provide fire and emergency services in Lowell Point. The borough would then have to utilize the assets where it has the power to do so or sell them at fair market value.

The Service Area ended fiscal year 2011 with an available fund balance of \$26,145.80. The Service Area board would like to appropriate the existing fund balance for the purchase of fire and emergency service supplies and equipment. It is recommended that any future transfer of assets to an entity that will provide public services in Lowell Point occur prior to June 30, 2012.

Shortened hearing has been requested which would allow the Service Area time to purchase and have the items on hand prior to the dissolution of the Service Area on June 30, 2012.

As part of the FY2010 capital budget \$375,000 was appropriated to remodel various departments at the borough to address functionality, of which \$241,966 was spent on remodeling the clerk's office and the risk management department.

The cost of remodeling the legal and finance departments to address functionality is estimated to be \$186,105. Including a transfer of funds from a completed project of \$16,463, there is currently \$149,497 available for this project, a shortage of \$36,608. The General Government Capital Project Fund fund balance has \$40,000 that is available to support this project.

The restrooms at the borough's administration building do not comply with ADA standards. The administration is proposing that the restrooms near the assembly chambers be upgraded this summer; this will require an appropriation prior to year end. The remaining restroom upgrades would be included in the FY2013 budget. The administration is requesting that \$40,000 also be appropriated from the General Government Capital Project Fund, fund balance for this project.

Shortened hearing is being requested as this will allow the project to be completed this summer.

The North Peninsula Recreation Service Area (Service Area) supported the community playground project as one of its capital project priorities, recognizing its benefit as the only community playground in Nikiski.

The Service Area was awarded legislative grant funding in the amount of \$225,000 for this project in 2011, which was appropriated through Ordinance 2011-19-20. Due to the substantial cost of playground equipment and in an effort to build a playground the entire community and peninsula could be proud of, the service area board appointed a playground committee that is tasked with seeking playground sponsors and donations, as well as developing the design of the playground.

Presently, the committee has raised \$45,058.74 in donations and has received commitments for inkind donations, and continues to work on fundraising events and sponsorships with expectations that more funding will be received.

AIMM Technologies Inc. (AIMM) approached the Mayor's office requesting a fee reduction for the disposal of special waste at the central peninsula landfill. AIMM provides disposal services of non-hazardous waste for smaller drilling companies who do not have their own disposal resources. AIMM was in the process of performing a contract bid at the 2011 disposal rates of \$20.00 per ton when rates for special waste disposal increased to \$85.00 per ton effective January 1, 2012 in accord with ordinance 2011-32(SUB) adopted September 20, 2011. When AIMM initially entered the contract they were not aware that fee changes were being considered

When the ordinance was adopted, AIMM had a final well to process for 2011. AIMM expected that the final well completion and disposal of all bulk drill cuttings would be completed before the end of the year, however drilling of the final well extended beyond the end of 2011. This resulted in an additional 3,000 tons of processed drill cuttings being generated during the first weeks of 2012.

AIMM will suffer a significant loss if they are required to pay the increased 2012 rates for the disposal of this final 3,000 tons as it will cost \$195,000.00 more than they anticipated. To offset these additional costs, the administration is recommending that the fees for the disposal of this final 3,000 tons of special waste be reduced to \$52.00 per ton. This will allow AIMM to fulfill their contract at a rate that will result in their costs equaling their revenues for this final disposal.

The borough's central landfill is able to use this special waste for alternate daily and intermediate cover reducing the onsite transport costs for cover material for the borough.

Your consideration of AIMM's request to reduce its fees from \$85.00 per ton to \$52.00 per ton for the disposal of this final 3,000 tons of special waste is appreciated.

Thank you for taking the time to meet us on February 21st regarding the Borough landfill rates. Per our conversation, AIMM Technologies, Inc. hereby formally requests a waiver on the 2012 pricing for Special Waste for approximately 3,000 tons of waste generated from local drilling operations in 2011.

AIMM Technologies, Inc. ("AIMM") is a worldwide industrial cleaning company specializing in advanced technologies for the refining, drilling, and petrochemical industries. After a long tenure on the North Slope, AIMM established an office in the Kenai Peninsula Borough ("the Borough") in June of 2006, after an asset purchase of S and R Enterprises. The goal of our Alaska Division was to bring our innovative service lines to the Peninsula, not only to promote economic growth in the area, but to offer our customers safe, cost effective alternatives. Over the last five years, AIMM has expanded our service lines to meet the needs of our customers and the community in a variety of ambitious projects, many of which have never been attempted in Alaska.

Our latest project, Drill Cuttings Management, was implemented as a result of our customer's requirements and the lack of disposal facilities in Alaska. Over the last few years, the drilling industry on the Peninsula has changed with the departure of many assets of "supermajors" and the arrival of midsize and independent drilling companies. The smaller drilling companies lack the infrastructure of the supermajors, and as a result, do not have the facilities to dispose of their non-hazardous drill cuttings in an economical manner. After long discussions with our customers and realizing the economic impact of a lack of local disposal options, AIMM developed a method for processing non-hazardous drill cuttings. During the development process, AIMM was in contact with the Kenai Peninsula Borough Solid Waste Department and Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation ("ADEC") to discuss the disposal options and criteria. After extended discussions, analysis, and agreements, AIMM was issued a temporary processing and disposal permit from the ADEC to process non-hazardous drilling wastes and to dispose the processed wastes at the Kenai Peninsula Borough Landfill ("the landfill"). When we commenced processing for the 2011 drilling season, we used the then current landfill commercial rate of \$20.00 per ton of Special Waste for our job costing and proposals.

Our drill cuttings management offer was warmly accepted throughout the local drilling industry. In 2011, AIMM processed and disposed of approximately 28,000 tons of bulk non-hazardous drill cuttings that generated revenue to the Borough of approximately \$568,000.00. In addition to the income generated, the bulk cuttings were utilized by the landfill as an alternative daily cover material, allowing the Borough to avoid the additional costs of having to purchase and transport material for daily cover.

On October 13, 2011, AIMM was notified via email that the Solid Waste Department would be increasing the price of Special Waste from \$20 a ton to \$85 a ton. At the time of receipt, AIMM had a final well to process for 2011 and did not believe that the price increase would affect any existing 2011 contracts. Unfortunately, drilling of the final well extended through the end of 2011 and was not completed until mid-January 2012. AIMM was able to process and dispose of all bulk drill cuttings received through the end of the December 2011. An additional 3,000 tons of processed cuttings were generated during the first weeks of 2012. Due to the narrow margins of the type of processing, it became obvious that AIMM would realize a significant loss by disposing the remaining processed material at the new Borough pricing and contacted the Borough in January to discuss a waiver for the remaining disposal.

For the current stockpiled waste (approximately 3,000 tons), AIMM requests that the Borough grant a waiver of the new 2012 rates and allow the disposal at the 2011 price of \$20.00 a ton.


