2006 Arctic Winter Games Legacy Projects

Kenai Peninsula Borough School District:

\$1.45 million, matched by \$290,000 from KPBSD, for 22 school activity buses that seat 32 passengers and are equipped with wheelchair lifts. Buses will be loaned to Arctic Winter Games during Games and will then be distributed to schools through out the Borough. Source-Federal Transit Authority grant with local match from equipment replacement fund.

\$302,000 cash for costs of housing of athletes and sports/cultural events at Kenai Peninsula Borough School District facilities in Kenai, Soldotna, Homer & Seward. Source: Federal HUD Housing grant

Tsalteshi Trails System:

\$170,000 cash, plus significant in-kind services & materials, for equipment and improvements to cross country ski trail system. Includes lighting & new signage for 5+ kilometers of trail and a new waxing building. Source-Federal HUD Sports Facilities grant, State DOT grant & in-kind from HEA, MRO Sales & ASRC Energy Services

City of Soldotna:

\$95,000 cash to purchase a new scoreboard and street-side reader board for the Soldotna Sports Center. Source-Federal HUD Sports Facilities Grant

City of Kenai:

\$200,000 cash for improvements to Kenai ice rink facility. Includes new bleachers, radiant heaters for spectator & team seating & general facility improvements. Source-Federal HUD Grant

Re: Economic Impact of Arctic Winter Games 2006 in the KPB

An estimate of the impact on the Kenai Peninsula Borough economy due to the 2006 Arctic Winter Games is desired. An effort is made in the following text to quantify that impact.

Taxable sales by SIC codes were evaluated using only SIC codes which could reasonably be assumed to have been impacted by the Games. To be included in the analysis, a gain in excess of five percent must have occurred from first quarter 2005 to first quarter 2006. This cut-off is reasonable, and perhaps conservative, because over the last several years, gains have ranged from one percent to six percent in overall taxable sales.

Based on the above conditions, sales occurring directly due to the Games totaled \$3,481,336.

In Homer, sales increased \$204,566, basically in 5800 – Eating & Drinking Places, Gifts & Souvenirs, and Hotels/Motels, resulting in sales tax revenues of \$9,205 (4.5%) to Homer.

Kenai sales increased \$1,350,516 in Communications, General Merchandise, Service Stations, Restaurants, Accommodations, and Car Rentals. At the three percent sales tax rate, these sales should have brought \$40,515 in sales tax revenues to the city of Kenai.

Soldotna sales increased \$870,407 with activity similar to that of Kenai. At the three percent sales tax rate, revenues received by Soldotna would be \$26,112.

In the non-city area of the KPB, sales increased \$1,055,847. Combining those sales with city sales, sales subject to the two percent rate in the KPB total \$3,481,336 and result in \$69,627 in sales tax revenue to the borough, ear-marked for the KPBSD.

It is reasonable to assume that a small portion of the sales increases would have occurred in these SIC codes without the Games, but it is also reasonable to assume that sales in numerous other SIC codes would not have occurred if not for the Games. Clearly, this is anecdotal information because it is an impossibility to quantify the actual impact.

Besides increased sales, borough residents also worked increased hours. General comments indicate that employees worked additional hours during the week of the Games, though few establishments hired additional workers. Construction projects (particularly legacy items), manufacturing, and medical services are a few items, which are not considered in the above analysis, though economic activity certainly occurred in those sectors. Each of these situations resulted in additional wages earned by KPB residents, and in increased spending in the local economy.

Intangible effects of the Games cannot be measured, but certainly the KPB benefits from an awareness by all the visitors who now know what this area has to offer during the winter months.

In addition to the above, the generally accepted multiplier for the KPB is 1.8.
