

ALASKA'S CONSTITUTION - ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 16

Should the builder be paid for this bridge if he is "involuntarily" diverted" of his access to, & use of, it? What are they worth?



THE MINING LAW, OF NECESSITY, AND HISTORICALLY, CARRIED WITH IT A RIGHT OF ACCESS FROM PUBLIC ACCESS, TO THE ORE BODY, ACROSS THE PUBLIC DOMAIN.

THE UNITED STATES FOREST SERVICE, IN GRANTING THE STATUTORILY REQUIRED, ACCESS, TO THE TRAVERTINE/TUFA DEPOSITS, LOCATED WITHIN THE RUSSIAN RIVER VALLEY, PROPERLY EXERCISED THEIR AUTHORITY WHEN THEY REQUIRED THAT A BRIDGE BE BUILT ACROSS THIS UNNAMED CREEK.

THE USFS FURNISHED THE "PLANS & SPECIFICATIONS" FOR A "LOG STRINGER BRIDGE" AND THIS BRIDGE WAS BUILT TO SUCH STANDARDS. IT WAS INSPECTED, AND APPROVED, BY THE LOCAL FOREST SERVICE PERSONNEL---ONE OF WHICH IS STANDING IN THE BACKGROUND.

THE BRIDGE HAS FOUR INCH DECKING WITH FOUR INCH RUNNERS THAT ARE LOCATED DIRECTLY ABOVE THE LOAD BEARING LOG STRINGERS. WE TRUCKED OUT ABOUT SIXTY TONS OF ORE BEFORE THE USFS AND US ATTORNEY'S OFFICES FILED A85-021 CIVIL, IN ANCHORAGE, TO STOP US FROM MINING.

ALL THE REQUIRED, AND APPROVED, PERMITS FROM THE FEDERAL, STATE, AND BOROUGH GOVERNMENTS WERE IN HAND AND AVAILABLE TO THE COURT AT THE TIME THE INJUNCTION WAS ISSUED BY JUDGE RUSSEL HOLLAND.

PLEASE CHECK ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 16 OF ALASKA'S CONSTITUTION. ONLY A TRIAL BY JURY CAN DETERMINE THE TOTAL DOLLAR VALUE OF THE DAMAGES WE HAVE SUFFERED FROM THE TOTALLY UNNECESSARY ABUSE OF OUR CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS.
